DOMESTIC VIOLENCE OUTREACH

Here's what I don't want people to know about me.

"I am an abuser. I am male, female, gay, straight, educated or not, wealthy, poor, or in the middle. I represent every ethnic and racial group possible. I may or may not have been abused as a child or adult myself. I do not necessarily dabble in alcohol or other drugs, but I may. I am a Christian, Muslim, and a Jew from any and all religious persuasions. I don't like myself very much, but I don't seem to be able to stop what I am doing. I may be more abusive when I am angry, and I seem to react strongly when I think a situation is getting out of my control. Sometimes my violence is physical, but not always. I also abuse people verbally, psychologically, and sexually. Sometimes I am so subtle, people don't even know it's happened until much later when they feel bad."

MYTH: Most of the time, domestic violence is not really that serious.

FACT: Domestic violence is an illegal act in the U.S. and is considered a crime with serious repercussions. Although there are aspects of domestic violence (e.g. emotional, psychological, spiritual, financial abuse) that may not be considered criminal in a legal sense, serious and long-lasting physical, emotional and spiritual harms can, and often do, occur. Each and every act of domestic violence needs to be taken seriously.

GET FILLED UP WITH GOD'S PERFECT LOVE!



Today we hear another challenging Gospel story. The Pharisees are challenging and scolding Jesus and his disciples because they don't follow the traditional rules for cleaning and eating food. How is this best explained to our children? Try this idea: Take an empty clear liter bottle (best if you take off the label so that your kids can clearly see there is nothing in it), and show it to your children. Ask them what is in the bottle. Some may say nothing, and others may say, "Air!" (which is correct!). Explain that if you were to point the bottle at someone and squeeze the bottle, you can feel the air coming out. Try it on your child. The reason you feel air coming out of the bottle is because that is what it is filled with. Next, start filling the bottle with water, and ask what would happen if you filled the bottle with water and then squeezed it? What would come out of the bottle? Water! I don't think you will need to prove this to them, although you might be tempted to do it!


Explain that what you just showed them is what the Gospel is about today. They are talking about the idea that whatever fills you is what then comes out of you. The Pharisees were concerned that if a person eats a lot of unwashed and unclean food, then they'd be filled up with unclean food and then only unclean actions, like lying and cheating, would come out of that person. But Jesus disagrees with part of what the Pharisees are saying. Jesus tells them that eating clean foods does not **stop** people from doing unclean things, like lying, stealing and cheating. Jesus says that people lie, steal and cheat not because of what they eat, but because their hearts are turned away from God.

It is true that eating healthy foods helps our bodies to be healthy. But it is also true that filling our hearts and minds with God's love and the Holy Spirit will help our hearts to be loving and our minds to be just. Jesus reminds the Pharisees and us today that our hearts are meant to be filled up and overflowing with God's perfect love. If our hearts are filled up and overflowing with God's love, then there is no room in us for the fear or temptation to lie, steal or cheat. If we are overflowing with God's perfect love, then that perfect love is what we naturally share with others. Just like the bottle – what we fill it with is what comes out when it is squeezed. That is what happens with us – we get filled up with God's love and then we share God's love with others.

Sunday Notes



DOERS OF THE WORD

The second reading for today begins a five-week series of selections from James, a letter that is classified among the so-called "catholic" (or universal) epistles because they are addressed to a general audience rather than to one particular community. Today's text offers important advice for Christians of every generation. God is first cited as the author of all gifts, and in particular, reference is made to the gift of baptism by which we have been made the "first fruits" of the new creation.

What follows is advice based on a very Jewish understanding of the "word" as an active force, operative in the world. We are reminded that unless we, too, become "doers" of the word, our claim to faith is empty. Today and in subsequent weeks the author reminds us that it is equally important to do the "works" of love, for example, by caring for the "orphans and widows in their affliction."

FEAST OF FAITH

What Jesus Did, What Jesus Said

The oldest account of what happened at the Last Supper comes to us not from the Gospels but from the First Letter of Saint Paul to the Corinthians: "I received from the Lord what I also handed on to you, that the Lord Jesus, on the night he was handed over, took bread, and, after he had given thanks, broke it and said, 'This is my body that is for you. Do this in remembrance of me' " (11:23-24). In our celebrations of the Eucharist, we are obedient to Christ's command to "do this." The priest, acting in the person of Christ, does what Jesus did and says what Jesus said. He takes bread, gives thanks, breaks it, and gives it to the Lord's disciples. He takes wine, gives thanks, shares it with us. We believe that the entire Eucharistic Prayer is consecratory, but we continue to hold these words of Jesus in special reverence. They are called the words of consecration, and the elevations of the host and chalice, the genuflections of the priest, and the optional ringing of a bell and use of incense remind us that we are in the presence of the Lord.


