### Notes from Fr. Bob...

#### FIFTH SUNDAY OF EASTER

For many years, the capital city of Brazil was Rio de Janeiro, a city by the sea, the legacy of colonialists who looked to Europe for their identity and culture. But it is claimed that in the 19th century, Saint John Bosco had a prophetic dream, in which he foresaw the construction of a new capital city deep in the interior of Brazil. Upon independence, that vision of a new capital was enshrined in the country's constitution, and in 1960 that new city – Brasilia – was completed and became the country's capital. The city symbolized for the Brazilian nation its own identity as a free, sovereign nation. It represented the country's confidence in itself – its capital no longer needed to be near the sea, looking back to Europe, to foreign masters. Instead, Brasilia stands right in the heart of the country, and symbolizes confidence in the future rather than a harkening back to the past.

In today's second reading we have a similar vision of a new city. St. John's vision is of the New Jerusalem, the holy city. It was a very evocative symbol for the early persecuted Church. The New Jerusalem became a symbol of hope for the future – for the time when there would be no more persecution, no more sadness or death – when ever tear would be wiped away. It functioned as an ideal – a goal to strive for, a means of keeping hope and faith alive in very difficult times. Above all, it embodied the early Christians' desire to be united with God, to be one with him, to see him face to face. Just as God had walked and talked with Adam and Eve in the Garden of Eden at the dawn of creation, so they longed for a new creation, when all would be made new and God would truly be Emmanuel – "God-with-them."

The Gospel tells us how the disciples had a very profound experience of the presence of God among them in the person of Jesus. But as he speaks to them at the Last Supper, Jesus tells them that he will not be with them for very much longer. He knows that he is soon to return to the Father and that the disciples will need something to keep their faith alive once he is no longer physically present with them. He knows that they will need something to bond them together, to give them a sense of community and of identity. What he offers them is his new commandment: LOVE ONE ANOTHER JUST AS I HAVE LOVED YOU. This commandment is the essence of all Jesus did and taught. As such, it is a way of prolonging the presence of Christ among them. The commandment also gives them a purpose: by their Christ-

like love, they will be bearing witness to Christ to the world.

The commandment of love thus provides the disciples with their identity, with their mission and with a continuing sense of presence among them.

Many religions teach the importance of love, but what is new about Christ's commandment is that he asks his disciples, to love JUST AS HE HAS LOVED. The hallmark of Christ-love is that it is sacrificial: "GREATER LOVE HAS NO MAN THAN THIS, THAT HE LAY DOWN HIS LIFE FOR HIS FRIENDS". Such a love will prove stronger even than death.

We all need hope for the future and encouragement in facing the difficulties of life. We all need a sense of God's presence, a sense of belonging to community, and of purpose and meaning in our lives. The early Christians expressed this in their longing for the New Jerusalem, for a new creation. God challenges us to allow him to begin that new creation with us – to let him make us new, recreate us. God asks us to let him wipe away our past

failures and mistakes. He wants to put an end to the sin and selfishness which leads to sadness and death. He wants to lead us to a new and brighter future. Quite simply, he wants to re-create us in the image of his Son, so that we can love as Christ loves us.

Easter Blessings— He is Risen! Alleluia!




#### JUBILEE YEAR OF MERCY REFLECTION: FIFTH SUNDAY OF EASTER JUBILEE DAY FOR YOUTH

This Sunday's "Youth Jubilee" previews July's World Youth Day in Krakow. Its theme from Matthew 5:7, "Blessed are the merciful," echoes Pope Francis' warning that "the practice of mercy is waning in the wider culture." In countercultural witness, therefore, "the time has come," says Francis, "for the



Church to take up the joyful call to mercy once more. It is time to return to the basics and to bear the weaknesses and struggles of our brothers and sisters." Jesus affirms the same in today's Gospel. "As I have loved you, so you also should love one another" (John 13:34). Francis concludes, "The Church's very credibility is seen in how she shows merciful and compassionate love." Jesus too asserts, "This is how all will know that you are my disciples, if you have love for one another" (John 13:35). Thus mercy "makes young" the Church, the world, and everyone. "Mercy is the force that reawakens us to new life and instills in us the courage to look the future hope" (Misericordiae Vultus, 10).

So, an Additional Parish-wide Survey is also part of his review process. Please note that the survey is available in English and Spanish. The data obtained from the Parish-wide Survey will be shared with Father Baker and your participation will remain anonymous. The Priests' Placement Board and I will also receive this data.



#### TREASURES FROM OUR TRADITION

The French Revolution swept the church in France away in an astonishing way, stripping the nation of every possible vestige of the faith, not merely shuttering churches, but using them as staging areas for pagan raves and romps. While millions of faithful simply went underground and hung on for the ride, even the seven-day week was demolished along with the names of the months. What emerged from the chaos was the Napoleonic Code of 1792 governing church life, and therefore marriage law in France, French Canada, and elsewhere. The code makes civil marriage mandatory for all citizens.

In practice, when the faithful marry, they go first to the City Hall. There, the mayor performs the civil marriage, usually accompanied by a patriotic speech about the duties of the citizen, particularly in the rearing of children. Then, typically after a lunch, everyone goes off to change into more festive attire for the wedding liturgy, featuring consent, the exchange of rings, and the nuptial blessing. Sadly, only a minority of citizens today celebrate even the civil form of the rite, and a fraction of those continue on to the church. For those who do celebrate the liturgy of marriage, however, there is near certainty that the spouses are active worshipers, and that they will later present their children for baptism.

#### SACRED QUIET/SACRED SPACE

Churches can become so familiar and comfortable that we sometimes forget how we are meant to behave in this sacred space. The space inside a Church is sacred not only because we gather for the communal purpose of celebrating the Eucharist there, but also because we believe that God is present in the Eucharist reserved in the Tabernacle (Real Presence). One of the ways we remind ourselves that we are standing in sacred space is by developing a sense of what I like to call sacred quiet. Sacred quiet reminds us that we are standing in the presence of a loving God. Sacred quiet reminds us to be mindful of those who are praying in this space and not threaten their quiet with needless conversation or frivolous behavior. Sacred quiet helps us to distinguish between necessary converse and unnecessary noise. Necessary converse might be the inquiries about the health of a parishioner, the cordial greeting extended to those around us, or the offer of condolences when a loved one has died. Unnecessary noise might be the discussion of dinner plans, the scores of last night's big game, or the frivolity associated with telling a joke.

It would be easy to suggest a ban on talking in Church, but such a ban would be unenforceable and not very Christian. All of us are called to have a sense of sacred quiet, particularly with regards that space that we call sacred. Please limit the ordinary and prolonged conversations to outside of the Church. Make every effort to be respectful of the Tabernacle, and assume that those who might be in a pew inside the Church are there because they want to pray in peace and quiet. When it is absolutely necessary to speak in Church, use that subdued soft voice used for telling secrets. We all should remember that when we find ourselves standing in sacred space, we are called to a sense of sacred quiet.


