

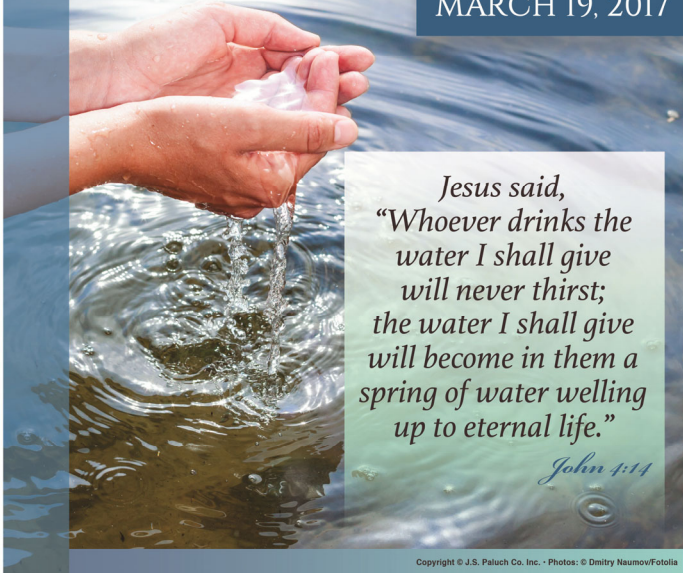

Notes from Fr. Bob...


3RD SUNDAY OF LENT

Few people need reminding that the resources of our small planet are limited. We can no longer plunder them at will, without a thought for the future. In particular there have been many warnings about erosion of the earth's supply of oil and many appeals to limit the use of the private car in order to reduce pollution of the atmosphere and conserve the supply of oil-based products. It is only more recently that we have begun to hear claims that it is water that should be our main concern... Not only because the water available for human consumption is limited and the number of people drawing upon it ever increasing, but also because water is absolutely vital to life of every kind. No water – no life; the equation is as stark as that.

Water is basic in a way that other natural resources are not. That is why the people of the Bible, just like every other group throughout the course of human history, show immense concern for their water supply. Today's first reading describes how Moses was faced with open rebellion over this very issue. The people felt they would be better-off back in Egypt as slaves than be 'tormented with thirst' in the desert.

As we turn to the gospel the theme of water reappears. We find Jesus asking the Samaritan woman for a drink, but then telling her – no doubt to her utter amazement – that he is able to offer her something more. "Living water" he calls it. And he goes on to say something still more extraordinary – that whoever drinks of the water he has to offer will "never be thirsty again", that it will become a spring of water gushing up to eternal life. Later in the gospel it becomes clear that what Jesus is offering under the symbol of water is nothing less than the Holy Spirit. By his death on Calvary, he will release the Holy Spirit like a flood upon all humanity. That Spirit will be more refreshing, more life-giving than any ordinary water could ever be, and ultimately will lead to eternal life.

The same idea appears just as powerfully in the second reading. Paul, writing to the Christian community in Rome, reminds them that "what proves God loves us is that Christ died for us while we were still sinners". It's his death that enables us to look forward in hope to sharing in God's glory. And this hope, Paul insists, is not going to disappoint us, because – and these are his exact words – "because the love of God has been poured into our hearts by the Holy Spirit which has been given us". The Holy Spirit, the love which binds Father and Son in perfect unity, is poured out upon us, tiny creatures. How can we hear Paul talking about God's love being poured



into
our hearts
without thinking of a
great river overflowing its banks
and sweeping across the surrounding countryside? As it
does so it brings new life into existence, it transforms the
landscape, it makes all things new.

This season of Lent is meant not only as a time of preparation for Easter but also a time of preparation for the sacrament of baptism or, in the case of those already baptized, of renewing our baptismal commitment. Today's readings, especially the passage of St. Paul, give us a new way of looking at baptism. When a person is baptized it is like a giant river being diverted to flow in a new direction, but this time the river is the Holy Spirit, God's own boundless love, and it is diverted so as to course into the heart of the newly baptized. The Holy Spirit comes to us to free us from sin but also to stay with us at the centre of our being. His presence transforms us, makes us the sons and daughters of God, leads us step by step towards that eternal glory where all our deepest yearnings will be satisfied. And so, in the fullest sense of the words, we shall never thirst again.

We may, as I mentioned at the outset, be living in an age where there's danger of water being in short supply, but there'll never be a time when the Holy Spirit is in short supply. God is always waiting to pour his love into our hearts. Whatever we undertake in the way of Lenten exercises will be of value in the measure that they open us up to receive the flood waters of God's love

Fernando dreams of becoming a businessman. He also dreams of a better future for his family, and this motivates him to sell cookbooks on San Salvador's buses. It's dangerous work for \$10 a day—gangs frequently stop and harass drivers and passengers—but he keeps going, determined to achieve his dreams.

It was his dreams that led him to YouthBuild, a six-month, CRS-sponsored program that trains young people in business. There, he found a positive community to help him pursue his passion, despite the challenges of life in El Salvador. "When I tell my classmates that I want to do something, they tell me to try it and to not hold back."

Fernando is putting his newfound skills to work. After graduating from YouthBuild in 2016, he took part in a series of entrepreneur workshops organized by CRS and is currently working on a new business plan. "We have a saying," says Fernando. "Once a YouthBuilder, always a YouthBuilder."

The group photo below is of members of Youth Build "Jóvenes Constructores" program supported by Catholic Relief Services and its local partners Glasswing. The program works with at-risk youth giving them workshops, seed capital to start their own business and connecting them with employers. Eighty percent of the youths participating in Jovenes Constructores get a job or return to complete their studies.

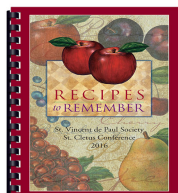

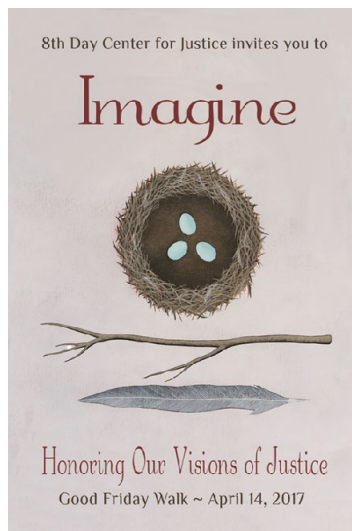

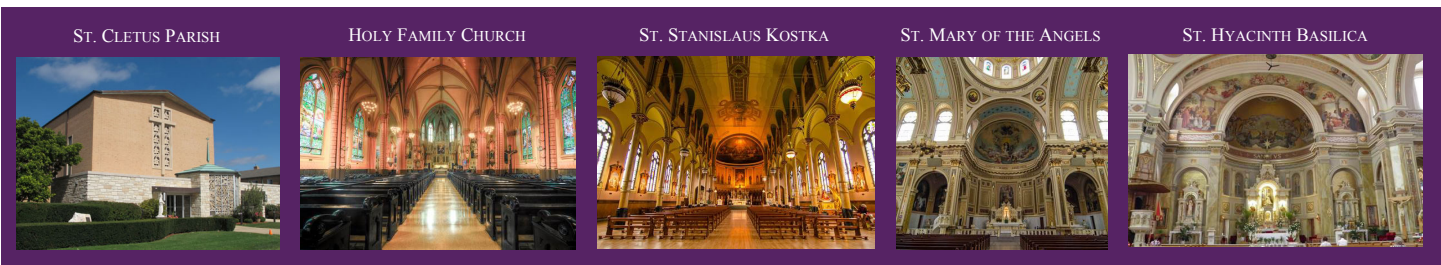
ACCOMPANYING THE “DEAR NEIGHBOR” AT TALLER DE JOSÉ

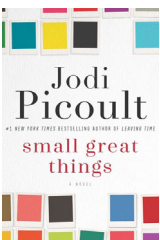
Our newly formed CCW will be meeting on Tuesday, March 21st at 7:00pm and we have an exciting speaker lined up for the evening:

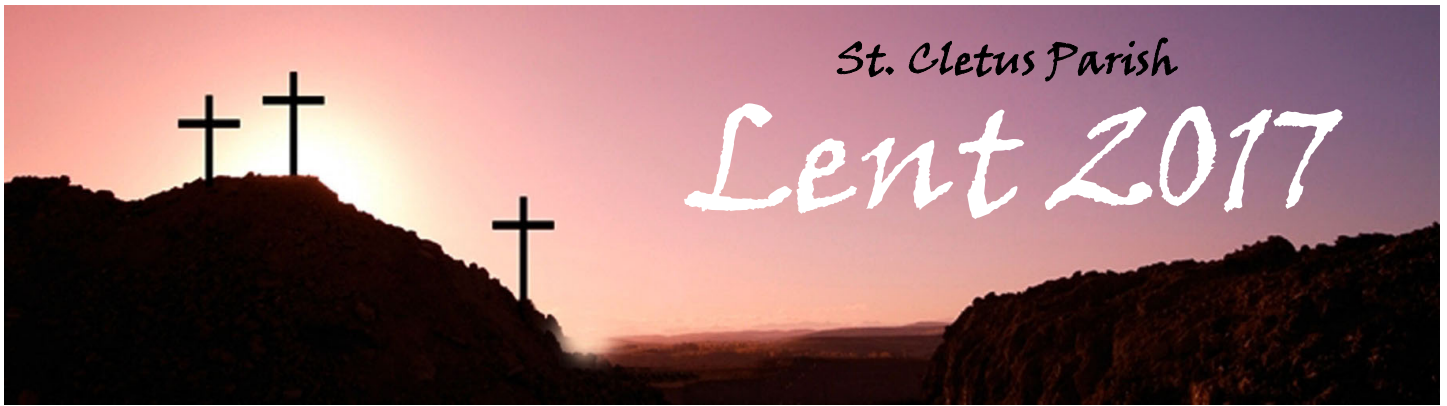
It is difficult to imagine anyone in today's world whose life has not been touched by cancer in some way. As a cancer survivor, I used the Stations of the Cross as a framework for this contemporary evening of healing and hope. The uplifting stories, prayers and music weave together the lessons I have learned – that when something frightening drops on our doorstep, God gives us opportunities as well. And, that Jesus, on his journey to the cross, really taught us how to be strong. While everyone's cancer experience may be different, we share commonalities that help us realize we are not alone. And, like Jesus, we can choose to help light the way for others.





It has been our privilege for our team to present these Stations of the Cross more than 20 times at churches throughout the Chicago and Joliet dioceses. We hope you will join us in prayer at St. Cletus this Lent.

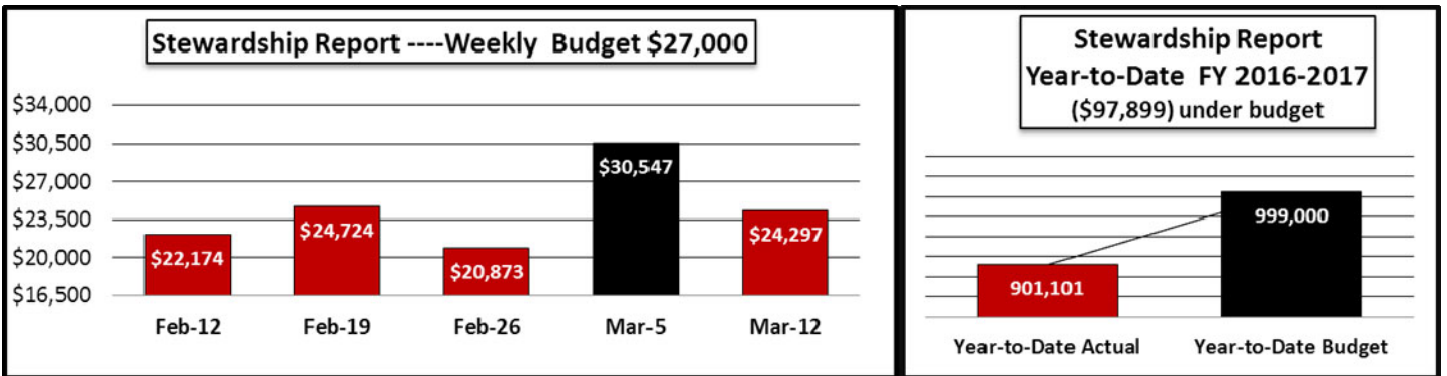
