Notes from Fr. Bob...

33RD SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME

Some years ago an elderly woman was being interviewed on television. All her adult life, she explained, she had spent as a nurse. "Tell me," the interviewer asked, "If you could have just one wish, what would it be?" To his astonishment and, I imagine, that of millions of viewers, she replied: "To meet our Lord and hear him say that he thinks I did a good job for him".

A surprising reply, yet, on reflection, just the sort of reply you might expect from a Christian. After all on the day when we have to give an account of our stewardship, there is only one question that will really matter: "Have I made a success of my life on earth? Have I served the Lord well?" We're perhaps tempted to think that if only we knew just when that day would be, we'd be ready for it. Paul insists that the day and the hour are hidden; admittedly, what he has in mind is "the Lord's day", the end of the world when the Lord will come again; but his words are equally relevant to the day of our death, the day when the world will end for us. It's shrouded in mystery; no-one can say when it will come - the Lord may arrive as unexpectedly as a burglar - and yet, says Paul, if we live wisely, like "children of light", then we won't be caught out.

Fundamentally, then, Paul's is a positive and encouraging message and so too is the message of the other two readings. In the gospel our Lord has a parable for us. It's the story of a wealthy man who, just before going abroad, gathers three of his servants and entrusts to each a number of talents. Incidentally, in the parable the word "talents" does not mean personal skills but rather silver coins, money; in fact a talent was a considerable sum of money, a small treasure. The one who had received five talents and the other, who had received two, both traded well and in fact doubled their treasure. But the servant who had but one talent became paralyzed with fear and simply hid the money; he was playing for safety, or so he thought. His master thought differently; on his return, there was a handsome reward for the first two wise, industrious servants, but withdrawal of his one talent, and punishment too, for the third, lazy, fear-racked servant. You may have noticed in the first reading also that the "perfect wife", as she is called, wins praise because she is wise and industrious because she uses her gifts well.

The moral could hardly be clearer: this life is enormously important, for what we make of it will decide our future: in the Kingdom of God, the disciple who responds fully to the gifts God has given him or her and uses them to good effect will receive still greater ones, while disciples too fearful or lazy to make any efforts will lose everything they thought they had. It's

easy for us to think that because we may

not have much in the way of talents and gifts we're not very important. However, in the gospel, the servant who came to grief did so not because he had only one talent but because he didn't use it. The fact is that each one of us, however meager our gifts may seem, has a vital role in God's plan. The idea is neatly conveyed in a prayer by Fr. Michel Quoist, called "The Brick". A bricklayer is at work; the first brick is laid on its bed of cement, others follow, slowly the building rises tall and strong. "I thought, Lord, of that brick," says the prayer, "buried in the darkness at the base of the big building. No one sees it, yet it accomplishes its task, and the other bricks need it. Lord, what difference whether I am at the roof-top or in the foundation of your building, as long as I stand faithfully at the right place?"

So long as we are genuinely trying to love and serve the Lord in the lowly events of life, we need not be overwhelmed with fear of rejection. On the contrary, if we are faithful in trying, we can be humbly confident that at death the Lord himself will greet us with those most glorious words: "Well done, you've been faithful in small things, come and join in your Master's happiness."


CONGRATULATIONS MRS. BENTLEY!



CHANGE OUR LIVES

The letters of Paul to the Thessalonians are among his earliest writings, and are driven by his belief and the belief of the entire early Christian community that the return of Christ was imminent, and that devoting time or attention to anything else was foolish.

As time progressed, this fervor subsided a bit. Today we may wonder, when we hear these readings about the coming end-times, if we should take them to heart, if we really believe that Christ still may come upon us as a "thief at night" (1 Thessalonians 5:2). Does this mean that we are to stop our long-range goal-setting, get rid of our yearly calendars and planners, or stop putting money in the college education fund? Of course not. What it does mean is that we need to change our lives, living like children of the light and illuminating the world around us with the light of the gospel. SAINT ROSE PHILIPPINE DUCHESNE (1769-1852)

November 18

Pope Benedict once declared himself struck by how remarkably diverse our American saints are—some native born: Mother Seton, Katherine Drexel, Kateri Tekakwitha; most, like many Catholics today, immigrants: Padre Serra, Bishop Neumann, Mother Cabrini, Rose Philippine Duchesne. When the French Revolution that dispersed her convent ended, Rose joined the Religious of the Sacred Heart, volunteering for their United States mission, opening the first free school west of the Mississippi. Only after lengthy service as Superior did Rose-now seventyone-realize her life's dream, undertaking a mission among the Potawatomi Indians. When some worried about her advanced age and failing health, the Jesuit mission leader overruled them: "She must come! She may not be able to do much work, but she'll bring the mission success by praying for us!" Frustrated by her inability to learn their languages, Rose nevertheless "spoke" to the Native Americans by her prayerful presence before the tabernacle. "Quah-kah-ka-num-ad," they named her, "Woman-Who-Prays-Always"-their way of bestowing the title the Church would later make official: saint! -Peter Scagnelli, Copyright © J. S. Paluch Co

When people are saying, "Peace and security," then sudden disaster comes upon them, like labor pains upon a pregnant woman, and they will not escape.

But you, brothers and sisters, are not in darkness, for that day to overtake you like a thief. For all of you are children of the light and children of the day. We are not of the night or of darkness. Therefore, let us not sleep as the rest do, but let us stay alert and sober.

GOSPEL

Mt 25:14–30 or 25:14–15, 19–21 In the shorter form of the reading, the passages in brackets are omitted.

Jesus told his disciples this parable: "A man going on a journey called in his servants and entrusted his possessions to them. To one he gave five talents; to another, two; to a third, one—to each according to his ability. Then he went away. [Immediately the one who received five talents went and traded with them, and made another five. Likewise, the one who received two made another two. But the man who received one went off and dug a hole in the ground and buried his master's money.]

"After a long time the master of those servants came back and settled accounts with them. The one who had received five talents came forward bringing the additional five. He said, 'Master, you gave me five talents. See, I have made five more.' His master said to him, 'Well done, my good and faithful servant. Since you were faithful in small matters, I will give you great responsibilities. Come, share your master's joy.' [Then the one who had received two talents also came forward and said, 'Master, you gave me two talents. See, I have made two more.' His master said to him, 'Well done, my good and faithful servant. Since you were faithful in small matters, I will give you great responsibilities. Come, share your master's joy.' Then the one who had received the one talent came forward and said, 'Master, I knew you were a demanding person, harvesting where you did not plant and gathering where you did not scatter; so out of fear I went off and buried your talent in the ground. Here it is back.' His master said to him in reply, 'You wicked, lazy servant! So you knew that I harvest where I did not plant and gather where I did not scatter? Should you not then have put my money in the bank so that I could have got it back with interest on my return? Now then! Take the talent from him and give it to the one with ten. For to everyone who has, more will be given and he will grow rich; but from the one who has not, even what he has will be taken away. And throw this useless servant into the darkness outside, where there will be wailing and grinding of teeth."


