Notes from Fr. Bob...

30TH SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME

Can anger be a good and positive reaction for the Christian? This question seems to go against the message, which many people heard as children. Anger was one of the seven deadly sins.

Anger can be a sign of love when it is a feeling which arises when we see injustice against another person. In this way, it represents a connectedness with those who suffer, to those who are victims, and is a sign of the need for justice to be re-established. At the same time, anger needs careful reflection because it may be coming from unresolved personal issues.

In the first reading from the Book of Exodus, we hear that God's anger will flare up because the widow and the orphan are treated harshly in society. The people of Israel, through their historical experience of slavery in Egypt, were very conscious of sufferings of people who were oppressed and needed liberation. At the same time, as their economic and social status improved in the Promised Land, there was the danger of forgetting their roots and the experience of slavery. The prophets called them back to this experience and reminded them of the experience of being slaves. They were called to extend justice to the poorest in society and especially to those who had no protection or rights. The widow and the orphan were especially marginalized since they had no male figure to protect them. The justice of people was to mirror the justice of God who was always concerned for the poor and weak in society.

Love is a very difficult word to understand these days. It has many different meanings. Often it can mean passionate, sexual, erotic, romantic love. Sometimes it can mean affection like the love of a dog or a pet. The dog responds with faithfulness and fidelity, usually for reward. It can also refer to friendship between men and women. Love in the gospel means self-giving love concerned totally for the other rather than self. Love of neighbor can be described as creating the conditions, which enable others to be themselves and achieve their full potential. It is a love leading to action, which respects, enhances, sees the best in the other, helps others, acts justly and seeks only the good of the other person. Is this sort of love humanly possible? At first it might not seem possible but it can only be lived with God's help and assistance. The gospel calls for continued striving to love like this but it does not expect perfection. It is reassuring that the saints were always very aware of their failing to live as God called. This is always an ideal, for



It is often said that love begins at home. There is a truth in this. Learning to respect and love at home can be most difficult, especially when families continue to change, teenagers mature and readjustments have to be made. Love is always concerned for the good of another and this eventually means giving another freedom, which can be painful. Each person has to live his own successes and mistakes. Love allows this to happen and is ready to welcome home. The father of the prodigal son must have suffered much when his son went away. While he welcomed him home, he must have felt pain and joy when he returned. The commandment to love can be very difficult.

Love is never satisfied. If love begins at home, then it has to extend outside the home, even to the very margins of society. Who are the weakest and poorest in society? Who are the ones like the orphan and the poor in Jewish society? Are they the asylum-seekers? Are they those fleeing from their homeland because of persecution? Love demands that we respect them and extend justice to the stranger and foreigner in society. This may need conversion as we overcome prejudice and stereotypes. Welcoming others and speaking up for others will often meet resistance and scorn; faithfulness to the gospel calls for perseverance in witnessing to the truth in love. Faithfulness to the gospel will always be rewarded.

Sunday Notes

BALANCE

Today's scriptures emphasize the fundamental link between love of God and love of our neighbors, especially those who are most in need. Love of God should compel us to love the people whom God cherishes. Conversely, work for justice and charity for those in need should be rooted in our love of God.

That connection and balance, however, isn't always easy to maintain in our lives. Even in religious orders we find that some Christians are more oriented toward contemplation and prayer, while others are more active in reaching out to those who are oppressed. Today Jesus reminds us of the necessity for both in the life of faith.

TREASURES FROM OUR TRADITION

This week we have in All Souls' Day a commemoration that is linked to the Halloween customs. The big-spending sugar shock holiday is a long way removed from Thursday's grateful remembrance of the souls who are hidden from our sight, but alive to Christ. Old pagan superstitions might find us holding our breath when going by the graveyard, whereas others might actually go to the cemetery to tend the family graves, to share good food, and remember dear ones. Nowhere does a culture embrace this day as fully as in Mexico. The "Day of the Dead" is a national holiday that unfolds over three full days.

For three thousand years, the indigenous people of Mexico have been mocking death in an annual festival, and the invading Spaniards were shocked at the spectacle. To the Aztecs, life was a dream, and death was the entry into full life. Skulls were thus a symbol of joy and release from life's sorrows. The missionaries found all this a bit creepy, but they moved the three-day feast from August to synchronize it with the Christian calendar. So today, graves are decorated, altars are built in the home to honor the family dead, children feast on candy skulls, and people dress up in elaborate skeleton outfits. The devout spend hours in the cemetery, and there is a lively sense of the communion of saints, the living and the dead.





DOMESTIC VIOLENCE

#MeToo — believing survivors of sexual abuse should always be trending

Inspired by the women who recently revealed their stories of abuse at the hands of filmmaker Harvey Weinstein, the hashtag #MeToo quickly trended on Twitter this week. [People were] invited people to share those two words if they have been victims of sexual assault or harassment.

And share they did.

Though the sheer volume of #MeToo posts is appalling, the number of survivors coming forward isn't what got my attention. It was the recognition that these women (and men) were being respected and believed. All I could think was, "It's about time!"

As someone who has worked to end domestic violence and sexual assault for more than 35 years, I can tell you that claims of sexual violence are very often met with skepticism or denial. Look no further than the recent mistrial of Bill Cosby to examine classic victim-blaming. In particular, a juror expressed disbelief of a victim's testimony because of what she wore when she went to Cosby's home.

Now, as we see #MeToo flooding Twitter and Facebook feeds, I hope we are finally at a tipping point where survivors' stories are viewed as credible. Will our primary reaction going forward be a collective embrace of victims — and accountability for perpetrators?

That is up to us.

We all have the power to create an environment for victims of sexual violence and harassment that will meet them with empathy and support. But many survivors feel too much fear or shame to report abusive acts to their friends, family or authorities. Let's change that narrative, and instead shape our culture into one that doesn't require Weinstein's predatory acts to get our attention.

Here are a few ideas we can start with:

- ·Believe survivors.
- •Be an upstander. If you see or hear something abusive happening to a friend or colleague, say something. A number of actors have spoken out and expressed their regret for being complicit in allowing Weinstein's behavior to go on for years.
- •Words matter and abusive or derogatory language about women should not be dismissed as "locker room talk."
- •Start by talking to boys while they're young. Have conversations with young males about respect for women and healthy relationships.
- •Have a clear workplace policy that addresses gender-based violence and sexual harassment, and a protocol that takes into account the needs, privacy and considerations of the survivors for enforcing it.
- •Watch a movie. Jennifer Siebel Newsom's documentary about toxic masculinity, "The Mask You Live In," will open your

eyes to ways we can help combat denigration of women in our professional and private lives.

I'm optimistic that the #MeToo phenomenon and reactions to Harvey Weinstein are indicators of a breakthrough on this issue. Let's ensure that believing survivors is always trending.

AARP TAX-AIDE NEEDS VOLUNTEERS FOR THE 2018 FILING SEASON




Looking for a rewarding opportunity to make a difference in your community?

However, some knowledge of your own personal tax matters is very helpful. All returns are prepared on computers, thus volunteers should be somewhat computer literate. Training classes will be held in January, 2018. Minimum time commitment during the filing season is 4 to 5 hours one day per week from early February to mid-April.




