# A Note from Fr. Elmer

### ABOUT FR. ELMER ROMERO

### **Ministerial Experience:**

I am a priest of the Archdiocese of Chicago. I was ordained on May 24, 2003 by Francis Cardinal George, Archbishop of Chicago. After my ordination, I was appointed as the Associate Pastor of St. Matthias and Transfiguration Parish in Chicago effective July 1<sup>st</sup>, 2003. On July 1<sup>st</sup>, 2006 I was appointed as the Pastor of St. Mark Parish in Chicago where I joyfully completed my term of six years. Then on July 1<sup>st</sup>, 2012 Cardinal Francis George appointed me as the Associate Dean of Formation at Mundelein Seminary where I assisted with the responsibility of forming future priests for our Church. Now I am here at St. Cletus Parish, because Cardinal Blase Cupich has appointed me as your new pastor effective July 1<sup>st</sup>, 2021.

### **Background:**

I was born and raised in Peru. My parents, Teodoro and Felipa, love children. They had 13 children. I am number 6. Dad and Mom, with their simplicity of life, shared with us their joy, care, and love. As I recall my upbringing, it seemed like we had a party or a picnic every day at home. They made a good team raising us. They showed us how to be responsible with our lives. They taught us to be respectful and caring. They found in God their inspirations, blessings, and patience to deal with us.

### **Vocation to the Priesthood:**

My vocation to the priesthood was nourished by my parents and home parish. Dad and Mom were the first ones to teach me how to make the Sign of the Cross, pray the Our Father and Hail Mary. Every night Dad would stop by our rooms and make the Sign of the Cross over our foreheads. Only after receiving Dad's blessing would we go to sleep.

When it was time for First Communion, Dad and Mom enrolled me in the Religious Education Program at the parish. I was lucky to have sister Adelinde Plieger (a nun from Austria) as my catechist. She was a good teacher. She was so friendly and joyful. So, I learned from her some of the foundations of our faith. Frequently, with some intensity, she would remind us that we would be receiving Jesus at the Mass of our First Communion. One day, she said to us, "Remember always that Jesus wants to be your friend forever." Since then, I am happy to let you know that Jesus has been my friend. He is a good and loyal friend. I am glad that he is your friend, too.

Another person that played a huge role in my discernment process to enter the seminary was my pastor, Fr. Pablo Fink Piok, a missionary priest from Italy. One day as we were delivering groceries to those in need, he said to me, "Elmer, God wants you to be his priest." I was not expecting to hear something like that at all. A few years

later, I heard from him again with the same invitation. At this time, I decided to pay more attention to his invitation and off I went to the seminary in Quito, Ecuador where I spent seven years before coming to Chicago in the summer of 1999. After arriving in Chicago, I spent a year at UIC learning a new language. Then, the following year, I entered Mundelein Seminary where I completed my priesthood formation in 2003.

God has been so good to me since I was born. He has given me wonderful parents. He has blessed me with amazing religious sisters and a caring pastor as I was growing up. Then, when I joined the seminary (Ecuador and Chicago), I was met by wonderful and caring people such as nuns, priests, and parishioners like yourselves. It was through their care, witness, and encouragement that God affirmed my vocation to the priesthood.

I am so happy to be part of your parish. I look forward to meeting and getting to know you personally. It is my hope that together we will continue to discern God's will for our parish community. I am confident that through your prayer and counsel God will show me how to be a diligent, attentive, and caring pastor.

### DOMESTIC VIOLENCE OUTREACH

## Who Is at Greatest Risk? 1

Any person, anywhere, can be a victim of abuse. Domestic violence affects both women and men, and cuts across all age, racial, ethnic, religious, educational, and socioeconomic strata. Available research, however, indicates that domestic violence does appear to be more prevalent in certain groups:

- women, including those who are single, separated, married or divorced;
- teens and young adults;
- women who lack access to their own financial resources;
- women who abuse alcohol or other drugs, or whose partners do;
- women who are pregnant and have been previously abused; and
- individuals whose partners are excessively jealous or possessive.

#### **Characteristics of Abusers**

There is no universal profile of an abuser. Perpetrators of domestic violence can be young or old, male or female, professional or unskilled, educated or illiterate, rich or poor, religious or secular, or of any race or ethnicity. Abusers run the gamut of psychological "diagnoses," ranging from perfectly normal to psychotic. However, abusers tend to:

- objectify their partners (i.e., treat them as a category or object, not as a full human being);
- feel entitled to get their needs met without regard to the needs or feelings of their partners;

- use power (be it physical, emotional, political, economic or spiritual) to make sure their agenda is accomplished;
- feel that coercion is an effective and acceptable way to get their needs met;
- have the opportunity to be abusive without being held fully accountable; and
- behave abusively with a particular victim.

Consciously or unconsciously, most batterers assume a sense of privilege, which is used to gain and maintain power, or the "upper hand" in the relationship. They tend to believe their behavior is completely justified and necessary to fulfill their role in the relationship, as the one who is in charge, in control, is the provider and is "king of the castle." They feel they have attained or have been endowed with privilege to behave the way they do, and do not believe what they are doing is wrong in any way. They believe the role of their partner is to do what she is told, and to further and support the batterer's agenda and needs. Examples of privilege used as justification by batterers include: being male; being physically stronger; being heterosexual, or alternatively being a more experienced gay or lesbian; being white; being a U.S. citizen or being documented (if an immigrant); being the wage earner, or earning more money if both are employed; being more highly educated; being ablebodied; and being more religious or observant, among others.

In addition, the following characteristics are often seen in abusers:

- Often, abusers will not clearly acknowledge that their behavior is abusive or even hurtful, even if they have been arrested and convicted of a violent crime. For example, an abuser may tend to focus on what "she said" that "made him" act in a way that he considers to be justified and not at all wrong. It often takes years for abusers to move through a process of healing within themselves.
- Following a discrete abusive incident, some perpetrators may be truly sorry for their actions. Some batterers are horrified that they have hit their wives or girlfriends, are overcome with remorse, and genuinely want to change. They may apologize profusely and shower their partners with gifts and extra attention. Unfortunately, without professional help from a certified batterer intervention program, the cycle of violence usually begins anew, often with more dangerous consequences in future assaults.
- Abuse is likely to continue and to progressively escalate if abusers do not address their violent behavior. Voluntary or court-appointed professional help is almost always necessary for a perpetrator to change his behavior. Certified batterer intervention programs take between one and two years to complete.
- Some abusers blame their violent acts on external factors such as their partner's behavior or provocation, being drunk, coping with a medical or psychological illness, or simply having a bad day. Experts in batterer intervention are quick to remind clients that they

themselves must take responsibility for their own behavior. There is no excuse for domestic violence.




# **Sunday Notes**

## **NO BAD NEWS**

There are many times when we say, "Tell me what I want to hear, and don't confuse me with facts." And we don't take kindly to someone who might be bold enough to snuff out our expectations.

The biggest problem with such an attitude is not that we miss out on the truth or the facts, but that we miss out on the new and surprising gifts others can give us. Like the townspeople in today's Gospel story, we too often refuse to allow others to display the talents that can be good news for us.

Today's readings call for hospitality and faith and discernment. Hospitality opens the doors of our hearts and minds to the "stranger" among us, no matter how familiar he or she may seem to be. Faith enables us to accept the gifts of others, no matter how alarming or "strange" they may seem to be. Discernment helps us discover the prophets in our midst, no matter how amazing they may seem to be. Hospitality, faith, and discernment—cultivate these. Then, nobody can bring bad news. ### FEAST OF FAITH

### **Little Mysteries**

Two small rites—or, as one liturgist has called them, "little mysteries"—accompany the preparation of the gifts. The priest or deacon takes a small cruet of water from the server and adds a drop of water to the wine. Then, after the elevation of the chalice (and the incensation, if incense is used), the priest washes his hands. Both of these actions were at first practical, matterof-fact realities: in the ancient world the wine was usually quite thick, and was generally mixed with water before it was drunk. And in the early church, when the faithful brought forward a great variety of gifts at this time, there was a definite need for the presider to wash his hands!

But now these rites serve a purely symbolic function. The mingling of the water and wine is accompanied by a prayer that speaks of the wonderful exchange of the Mass, the mingling of Christ's divinity and our humanity. And as the priest washes his hands, he prays words of supplication from Psalm 51, acknowledging his own sinfulness in the presence of the assembly before he dares to approach the altar for this most sacred action. -Corinna Laughlin, Copyright © J. 

# **Religious Education**


### REJECTION AND BELONGING

Just about every person who has ever lived has at one time or another experienced rejection (not being liked or included). Rejection is an unfortunate part of life, yet it is definitely still a part of life. Some of us have faced rejection on a playground when we were not chosen for a team. Others of us have had friends tell us they no longer wanted to be our friends. And maybe our family has even rejected some of us. In whatever form rejection comes to our lives, we need to know how to handle it. Jesus gives us a wonderful picture of dealing with rejection. Jesus understands rejection. He knows what it is like for us because He has been rejected more than all of us put together. In our Gospel reading today, we hear how Jesus was even rejected by His hometown friends and neighbors. The very people that He grew up around. They didn't like Jesus very much in Nazareth. The Gospel tells us that Jesus was amazed at their lack of faith.

Jesus continues to experience rejection by people to this day. Many people continue to have a lack of faith. When Jesus died on the cross, He handled His rejection by asking God to forgive those who rejected Him. Jesus loved those who rejected Him. He did good to those who treated Him bad.
