## Notes from Fr. Bob...

#### **EASTER SUNDAY 2018**

The old man had been a soldier of the Second World War, and then a coalminer. When he died, his grave was a simple place, with a black headstone, bearing his name and the dates of his birth and death. The earth itself is simply grassed over. About a year after his death his daughter came over from Germany, accompanied by her German husband, and they brought with them a beautiful black lantern, which they placed on the grave. Apparently, it is a familiar custom in Germany to adorn the graves of loved ones with lanterns, and to light candles within them on those special days in November when the dead are commemorated. How poignant, too, that a German son-in-law should place a lantern on the grave of an American soldier. Sadly they never got the chance to light the lantern on that grave, for within a few months of it being placed there, the beautiful lantern was stolen.

This stealing from graves is nothing rare these days. "Is nothing sacred?" someone asks. Apparently not. Yet it remains a most upsetting thing to have anything stolen from a grave. Our loved ones are so precious to us, and their graves are sacred places. Though they are gone from us, we tend their graves and keep them neat and tidy, just as we hold their memory ever dear in our hearts.

On the morning of Easter day, the women who went to the tomb were about to begin the process of tending the grave, by anointing the dead body of Jesus and then reclosing the tomb. How shocked they must have been to see the stone rolled away, and how much more upsetting it must have been for them to discover that the body was not in the tomb. It must have been stolen! "Someone has taken it," Mary Magdalen cried. Going back to the disciples how sad the women would have felt to bring the terrible news.

This news has to be verified, so Peter and John run to the garden where the tomb is located, and the evidence is lying there before them. Grave cloths left on the ground. Head cloth rolled up in a place by itself. What does it all mean? What has happened here? This is not the work of grave robbers. Why would they unwrap the body? No. Something stranger still than grave robbery has happened here. This is death robbery. Death has been robbed of its power. It has been robbed of its power to devastate and to destroy. Life has returned to this place, and to this world, and to our lives.



"Until this moment," the Gospel of John says, "the disciples had failed

to understand the teaching of scripture, that he must rise from the dead." Some things are very hard for us to understand. Some things are outside of our experience, and some are beyond our wildest expectations. For many people some things are beyond the realms of possibility. Rising from the dead is one of those things. It just does not happen. All the evidence tells us that death is pretty final. It is the end of everything. It is our dissolution.

Acceptance of the fact of death is in many ways a mature attitude, a realistic response to the fact of our mortality. Yet there is another response, a rebellion against death, a protest, that Dylan Thomas, the poet, so eloquently expressed when he told us to "rage, rage against the dying of the light". Is it not true that death in so many ways makes a mockery of life? It is almost an insult to all that life hoped to be, for to die is to lose life.

Now, here, on this Easter day, we have the great discovery, the great find. Life wins. Love wins. John, the beloved disciple, who was to write so eloquently of life and love, went to the tomb, "he saw and he believed". What he saw was an empty tomb, but he also "saw" more deeply into the mystery of what the empty tomb means. It means that the Lord id risen, and in him the fullness of life has been restored to us. So, even the stealing of a lantern from the grave is not the end of the world. Christ is the light of the world, a light that darkness cannot overpower. St. John saw that for himself on that first Easter morning. May that same Easter light shine on us today.

Dear Sisters and Brothers in the Risen Lord Jesus,

The news today seems to be dominated by death-dealing forces and foreclosed possibilities. This past year has brought us a plague of gun-violence, streams of helpless refugees in different parts of the world, struggles in our own nation around questions of immigration and racism, countless victims of natural disasters, and large numbers of people who are—in the words of Pope Francis— "discarded." There seems to be scant room for hope and optimism.

Yet, we know by our own experience as believers and our common bonds of faith that this is not the full story of reality. There, indeed, is other news, the good news of our Easter faith. Christ has conquered all death and evil. Christ is risen!

In the Archdiocese of Chicago, our commitment to *Renew My Church* means that we take our Easter faith seriously to the point that it becomes the source of new energy for communities and individuals who share our faith with the world and bring it hope the world cannot take away.

May our faith in the Risen Lord be alive in our hearts, and may we share that gift widely and generously with others.



#### FOOD PANTRY UPDATES

We are making many exciting updates and changes to our food pantry. Our long term goal is to improve the food pantry to best meet the needs of our neighbors where they are, serve them with dignity, and provide pathways to self-sufficiency. Most of the steps to achieve these goals will happen beginning in May. An overview of each of these changes is below:

**Permanent Space**: The food pantry has had a small storage space and each month we move everything into the Church Narthex for distribution. We are beginning to permanently move the pantry to the rectory basement and host our distribution out of this space instead of Church. This will allow us to expand our storage capacity, offer client choice, add freezers/refrigerators, and offer weekly distribution to clients

**Extended Hours & Weekly Distribution**: We are thrilled to finally be able to offer distribution weekly (instead of monthly) to the clients starting in May. This increases access to food, particularly to working families, by extending hours and dates to open our doors on a more frequent and accessible basis. **Distribution will switch this to every Thursday night from 6:00-8:00pm**. Clients will still be able to come just once a month but will have many more options to come when it is most convenient for them

**Client Choice**: This will allow us to shift from pre-packed bags to full choice distribution, encouraging healthy food choices, nutrition, and dignity for pantry clients by allowing them to select the items they wish to receive while also reducing food waste.

Wider Variety of Items: With this new space we will be able to offer meat, milk, and other cold/frozen perishable items. We currently have an onsite garden with 10 raised beds. With the increased space and distribution schedule we will be able to get our homegrown, organic, local produce to the clients more often so less food goes to waste.

**Technology**: Starting in April, we will switch over our paper registration book to the Greater Chicago Food Depository online client registration system, Food Bank Manager. This will streamline our intake process and significantly improve our capacity to track data.

**Volunteers**: These changes will shift some of our current volunteer roles while opening up many new opportunities for volunteers, especially during Thursday evening distributions. We will be looking for additional volunteers to help on Thursdays between 5:30-8:30pm. A Sign Up Genius will be used and can be accessed on the St. Cletus website under the Social Concerns-Food Pantry tabs.

All of these changes and updates to our pantry will help us to provide better service to more clients, more often. We will continue to post updates in the Canticle in the coming weeks with more details on each of these components and ways you can help. We encourage you to check back often as we move forward on these exciting updates. Thank you for your continued support of this important ministry.






#### TREASURES FROM OUR TRADITION








We are truly grateful for the outpouring of generosity from our






