

Notes from Fr. Bob...

THE NATIVITY OF ST. JOHN THE BAPTIST 2018

Are there signs that appear at a child's birth which indicate what he or she will become? The ancient world believed that signs accompanied an important birth. When Alexander the Great was born there were storms and earthquakes and two eagles appeared, which were said to prevision his conquest of Asia and Europe. But even today psychologists have shown that there are less dramatic indications in young children of what they will become as adults. Long before you can express yourself with words you may show signs of your future temperament. So if you show signs of aggression or shyness very early on as a child these can be a sign that these traits may also appear when you are grown up.

Today we are celebrating the birth of someone who showed signs that he was a prophet even before he was born. Normally the liturgy celebrates saints on the day of their death and, in fact, only celebrates the birthdays of three people: Jesus, Mary, and John the Baptist. Why does John the Baptist merit this honor? Even at his birth his family is full of wonder as they ask, "What will this child turn out to be?" If we look at the events and signs that surround his birth, we can begin to appreciate why, as Jesus said, "of all the children born of women there is no one greater than John.

First, John's parents represent the righteous people of the Old Testament. Elizabeth, barren and old, is blessed with this child. Zechariah, his father, receives the news from the angel in the Temple with all its ancient rituals. The child is circumcised on the eighth day. Then the name John is given, which makes a break with tradition. John brings together the new and the old. He is the hinge between the two testaments. And even in the womb he jumped for joy in recognition of Jesus when the pregnant Mary visited Elizabeth. Even before birth he was the precursor of Jesus. But also in his death, beheaded by Herod, he points forward to Jesus' death under Pilate in Jerusalem.

Second, at his birth his father Zachariah recognizes this little child as a "Prophet...(who) will go before the Lord to prepare the way for him". Through preaching repentance he will make ready the way for Jesus and finally have the singular honor of baptizing him. John's baptism was to be in water alone and he directs our gaze to Jesus' baptism, which will be in the Holy Spirit. But, thirdly, John will show his humility. He knows that he is only the voice crying in the wilderness while Jesus is the



Lamb of God who will take away the sins of the world and he, John, is unworthy to baptize him or untie his sandals. His role is clear: he must give way to Christ. "He must grow greater, I must grow smaller."

How can we celebrate this feast of John the Baptist's birthday? Here at Mass, of course, but also by heeding his words and putting into practice the lessons of his life. If we are going to recognize Jesus for what he is, then we must see him against the long history of the Old Testament. We cannot appreciate the new without knowing what came before. We will then appreciate how Jesus fulfills what the prophets foretold. Once we have recognized Jesus as the Lamb of God who takes away the sins of the world, then we too need to repent and confess our failings so that he can heal us. As we go to confession John's words of judgment can touch our consciences and convict us so that Jesus may grant his forgiveness and absolution.

And finally, as Christians who have been sent to evangelize and to point the way to Christ, we need the humility of John. For Christians, not just those who are lay ministers, deacons, or priests, are called to be sure that we are pointing to Christ and not to ourselves. We are also here to prepare the way for his coming. For from now on, after this feast of midsummer, the days will be getting shorter until Christ comes at Christmas and the light increases in our lives. So, too, we are called to decrease and let him increase.

Notes from Deacon Stuart Heyes

Regarding last week's homily I gave at the Sat vigil mass and at 7.00 and 8.00 on Sunday morning.

The power cut and loss of the sound system prevented many at the 5.00pm mass hearing my homily and I had several requests to publish it - so here it is. Enjoy.

This week's gospel offers one of the many parables Jesus used to teach his followers. He uses them because it is the language and images with which they are familiar - and it's very effective.

As I meditated about the scripture for today I was struck by the Majestic Cedar tree in the first reading and how it compared to the lowly mustard seed bush in Christ's parable in Mark's Gospel. It occurred to me that the Cedar tree could be likened to the foundation of our faith:

- We have the very sturdy root system the trinity well established, firm, immovable.
- The sturdy upright trunk 2000 years of the growth of Christianity and the Papacy.
- The major branches the Commandments and the Sacraments that support and guide our faith lives
- The smaller branches the parishes and communities of which we are a part
- The leaves our families that are nourished by all of this.

The Mustard bush, with its interwoven branches, unkempt appearance and rapid erratic growth - that's a metaphor for the messy world in which we live - the structure of the Cedar is missing, most of its growth is hidden from the light and in this darkness - evil festers.

Why do I make this analogy?

Because the number of Mustard bushes in the world are increasing at a much greater rate than the Cedar trees - More and more of the people of this world don't have the time nor the desire to grow with the Cedar but want the faster fulfilment offered by the mustard bush. They don't appreciate the beauty of the Cedar and importance of its teachings - they want the instant gratification offered by the Mustard bush.

So let me pose a question - What do shopping malls and Christian churches have in common?

Answer - They are being abandoned by millions of Gen Xers and Millennials in favor of Internet shopping in the case of brick and mortar stores and a view that organized religion is irrelevant in the case of churches.

70% of the Western European population identify as Christian - but only about a quarter of those attend a church monthly or more, the churches are empty!

And right here in St Cletus - attendance has declined 40% since Marlene & I joined back in 1992.

I have the privilege of celebrating most of the English baptisms here and I say to the parents, "this is a great start to the children's faith lives but it's only a start. But in 9 / 10 cases they don't come back, despite the promises the parents and Godparents make during the sacrament - they all go back to the Mustard bushes.

Our faith needs feeding - regularly - you don't get that in the mustard bush, you get it on the Cedar tree. We on the Cedar tree need to encourage our family and friends who are in the mustard bushes to come and join us. One person or one family at a time.

How you might ask?

Well certainly not by catechism lessons and deep theological arguments but by our example of a "Life lived in Christ." Pope Paul VI said "Through wordless witness - (i.e. How we act) Christians stir up irresistible questions in the hearts of those who see how they live, - such as: "Why do they live like this, or What inspires them?"

It is by our living, loving examples that we draw people out of the darkness of the Mustard bush and pull them up onto the Cedar tree with us. Certainly it's a challenge, but let us start with those closest to us.

Today/Tomorrow we celebrate FATHER'S DAY and the value of a Father within a family. God understands the enormous value of a Father in family life - he gave Joseph to Mary and baby Jesus. Joseph raised Jesus into manhood demonstrating the protective, nurturing role that God intended for fathers. God Bless St Joseph.

I would like to wish all the fathers here today a very Happy Father's Day. But also ask that we remember today fathers who may be serving overseas and thus away from their families, Men who didn't have the good fortune to be a father but who really wanted to. Men whose children were aborted against their will or without their consent. For them this is not a happy day, so let us keep them in our hearts and prayers.

May you all continue to enjoy the view from the majestic Cedar and be living examples of our faith on Father's Day and every day. Amen

How old do I have to be to volunteer? Volunteers need to be 14 years old to volunteer at the Food Depository during regular sessions. Ages 16 and older can volunteer self-supervised. Ages 14 and 15 need to have one adult supervisor per 10 youths.

What should I wear? Volunteers must wear long pants and close-toed shoes. You will not be permitted to work in the warehouse if you are wearing sandals or shorts/ short skirt. Depending on the project you are assigned to, you may be asked to remove jewelry above the waist (including piercings, but rings are acceptable).

Where is the GCFD located? 4100 W. Ann Lurie Place, Chicago, IL 60632, which is a few blocks from I-55 and Pulaski.

Can I volunteer on my own? Yes, but you have to schedule a time with the Depository in advance (773) 247-3663 or www.chicagosfoodbank.org. If you volunteer at the Depository on your own, please designate St. Cletus Food Pantry, Agency #A01336, as the recipient of your volunteer credits.



JOHN THE BAPTIST

Since June 24 falls on a Sunday this year, the Church has the opportunity for a more intense celebration of the birth of John the Baptist, who is often described as the last of the Old Testament prophets and the bridge between Judaism and Christianity. More commonly, John is known as the "precursor" of our Lord Jesus Christ. All the Gospels report John's basic message: Repent, the kingdom is near at hand. One greater than I is coming.

Though he was a wandering preacher who dressed in camel skins and ate grasshoppers, John's legacy is one of true royalty. His origins are similar to those foretold by God through the prophet Isaiah: "You are my servant, he said to me, Israel through whom I show my glory" (Isaiah 49:3). John's humility—"I am not he"—was surpassed only by that of his Lord Jesus, the humble servant who followed.

TREASURES FROM OUR TRADITION

It's midsummer day! We have the advantage of celebrating one of the great hidden treasures of our liturgical calendar on a Sunday this year. There are only three "nativity" feasts on our calendar: for the Lord, the Blessed Mother (September 8), and today's birth of the Baptist. Today's date is anchored by the Annunciation (March 25), when Mary learns not only of her own child's advent, but of Elizabeth's child. We are exactly half a year away from Christmas Eve.

There are strong traditions around this feast. Just as the winter solstice provides a rich vocabulary for Christmas, so does the abundance of light at midsummer inform this celebration. Just as at Christmas, a religious festival spills over into culture. As summer light reaches its peak, the sun-drenched zones of northern Europe see people staying up all night, lighting "St. John's fires" in the long summer twilight. Bonfires seem to be the unifying force in all these celebrations, kindled along the shores of the St. Lawrence in Ouebec and Montreal, with harbor illuminations in France. You may be most interested in the custom in San Juan, Puerto Rico, the Baptist's own city. People there will leap into the sea between midnight and dawn to honor John. Why not find your way to a pool, a lake, or a sandy beach today and plunge in to recall your baptism? It's a tradition!

AUTOMATED EXTERNAL DEFIBRILLATOR

There is an automated external defibrillator available in the Minister's Room in the narthex of St. Cletus Church.

What is an AED? An automated external defibrillator (AED) is a lightweight, portable device that delivers an electric shock through the chest to the heart. The shock can potentially stop an irregular heart beat (arrhythmia) and allow a normal rhythm to resume following sudden cardiac arrest (SCA).

Who can use an AED? Non-medical personnel such as police, fire service personnel, flight attendants, security guards and other lay rescuers who have been trained in CPR can use AEDs. Although formal training in the use of an AED is not required, it is recommended to help the rescuer increase their comfort and level of confidence. However, AEDs are intended for use by the general public. Most AEDs use audible voice prompts to guide the user through the process.


