Notes from Fr. Bob...

FIRST SUNDAY OF ADVENT 2018

Today Jeremiah is surrounded by the experiences of defeat, disaster and destruction. The city of Jerusalem is sacked, the Temple is pulled down, and people are taken away into exile. But this 'seer', this man of far-seeing eyes, can foresee a time of hope and promise, a time when God will restore life and land and liturgy to his people, a time to rejoice. Lamentation will become laughter, and tears of sorrow will become tears of joy.

So too, Jesus today, in his final messages before his own trial and torment, speaks of the dark days to come on his own people, and on all mankind, but at the same time, he tells his followers not to be afraid. Instead, let your lives be honest and honorable, even then you will have no reason to fear, and every reason to stand with confidence at God's coming. God's coming spells liberation, freedom. Only those whose lives are evil need fear the coming of the Holy One.

How, then, shall we live in this "meantime" between the days of Jesus on earth and the final coming of the Son of Man? Saint Paul today gives us the example and the teaching. He points to the need for us to make progress in virtue. Never live a self-satisfied life, nor think of yourself as 'fine just as you are'. There is so much more to do, so much more of the journey of life for us to travel until we reach the end of our days; so much more in loving others, and in loving "the whole world." If you arrive at that stage of life, then you will have really travelled!

We have no reason to be complacent about the condition of this world, with all its struggles for justice, peace, alleviation of hunger and poverty. In the same way we have no reason to be complacent about our own human relationships and our capacity for good and ill in the lives of others.

Our life is not a private journey to individual perfection, but a common endeavor to share in the joys and sorrows, the hopes and fears of our fellow travelers and companions in this world. We need to remember that we are all pilgrims together in joy and in hope.




TAIZÉ PRAYER DEC. 2ND AT 5PM

WELCOME TO THE GOSPEL OF MATTHEW

As we begin this new liturgical year, we will be hearing the Gospel of Matthew.

Each of the gospels is unique and in some of its content. Each gospel is shaped by the needs, the problems, and the trials and challenges of the community for which the gospel was written. Matthew's gospel was written for the Jewish followers of Jesus who had continued to attend the synagogue regularly. Matthew presents Jesus as the new Moses by having him do "Moses-like" things: he gives the people new rules of behavior-the Beatitudes; he has miraculous powers (healing, curing, forgiving); brought hope to many people. The main theme of his gospel is that "the kingdom of God is like..." a reign of peace and love, of harmony and serenity, of forgiveness and mercy.

THE JESSE TREE

This passage is the basis for the Jesse Tree, which has become a symbol of Christ's heritage, or roots, and God's covenant with the Jewish people. The stump symbolizes the family of the Jews; the shoot, Mary; and the branch, Jesus.

In the Old Testament, Jesse, the son of Obed, was a poor farmer in Bethlehem. He had 8 sons, the youngest of whom was David. As a boy, David was anointed by Samuel to succeed Saul as king of the Israelites. Christ was to be born of the house of David in Bethlehem.

Today the Jesse Tree is used to trace God's promise of the Savior and Christ's ancestry. There are some variations of the symbols but primarily the same intent.

Our Jesse Tree is near the ambo. Each day, simple paper ornaments will be added with a symbol on one side and Scripture passage on the other side. Please come up and take a look.

 - 4 God's agreement with Abraham
 - 5 Abraham's sacrifice to God
 - 6 Jacob's dream

First Sunday of Advent

Prepare the Way ...with HOPE

The word Advent comes from Latin "adventus" which means coming. During Advent we remember Jesus' first coming into the world as we prepare for a new coming.

The season gives us the opportunity to honor the gifts of past, present and future, by remembering Jesus' birth in Bethlehem (past); anticipate his coming in glory (future); and celebrating his coming to us in word and sacrament (present).

However, this time of year is such a busy time, we can easily fail to center our attention on what is the most important gift of Christmas: the presence of God in our lives.

The shopping, the concerts, the parties, the traffic, the lines of people, the decorating and gift-wrapping consume our lives for weeks as we prepare for Christmas. Everything is done, or is it? We are exhausted, stressed, impatient, frustrated, financially drained and generally disconnected from the "reason for the season". Have we missed opportunities to be loving, joyful, forgiving, hope-filled and peace-making? Have the only gifts we pursued been purchased on-line, or at Macy's or Target - or have they been discovered in shared moments of tenderness and forgiveness, in generosity and gratitude for one another? Have we made time to remember and rejoice in all of the gifts that Jesus brings to us through his life, death and resurrection?

To help us prepare for Christ's coming through joyful waiting and hopeful expectation, we have placed an **Advent Ribbon Tree** in the narthex with colorful ribbons focusing each week on one of the themes of Advent. We invite you to take a ribbon and place it on your tree or table. We include a prayer below and action suggestions as reminders to prepare for Jesus: with HOPE (week 1), with PEACE (week 2), with JOY (week 3), and with LOVE (week 4).

Help us to remember always that you come to us each day in the people we meet. Help us to be persons of forgiveness. Help us to make our homes and work and school - places where everyone is treated with kindness and respect. Help us to be grateful for each day and be willing to share our gifts with one another. We trust in you who is always with us. Help us to be a people of hope in our world.

HAPPY NEW YEAR

Advent begins the new liturgical year for the Church. The liturgical year revolves around the 3 synoptical Gospel writers : Matthew, Mark and Luke. (Synoptical meaning the gospels are similar.) The cycles are referred to as Years A, B & C. John's Gospel which is used sporadically throughout the year, but especially in the Easter season, is written with a different outline and approach. This is Year C and the Gospel of Luke is the focus.

It is believed he also wrote the Acts of the Apostles and his audience was largely made up of Gentile (non-Jewish) Christians.

Advent prepares us through joyful waiting and hopeful expectation for Christ's coming – not as a baby but as the resurrected Christ. Part of waiting for the Lord's coming includes being ready. We wait with hope for the second coming of Christ and we wait with joy for the celebration of Christmas. The Gospel tells us to "Stay Awake". Our faith is not an hour on Sunday – a switch we turn on and off or a check mark on our "to do" list. Our lives are expected to be transformed by and reflections of the Gospel. The best way to be ready for God's coming is to live the message of the Gospel every moment.

Advent is the season of God's love made visible in Jesus, may we make visible our love for him and one another.

Some Advent practices:

- Advent Wreath 4 candles, 3 purple & 1 pink marking the 4 weeks of Advent around an evergreen wreath symbolizing the continuous love of God and that even in the darkest days of the year, there is life.
- Candles in the window, a sign that all are welcome, and that Christ is the light of the world.
- Blessing the tree and the Crib in your home.
- Do a family activity such as adopt a family for Christmas select gifts together or experience a service activity together.
- Make ornaments.
- Read story of the real 12 Days of Christmas.
- Research the legend of the Candy Cane.
- Observe St. Nicholas Day on December 6th- put a shoe out the night before the feast.
- Pray each night and celebrate the Sunday Eucharist.
- Check the Canticle for special Advent services (Taizé, Adoration, Holy Hour, etc.)


