Notes from Fr. Bob...

THE HOLY FAMILY OF JESUS, MARY, AND JOSEPH

The Christmas story recalls the fact that Mary and Joseph were unable to find room at the inn. Instead Jesus was born in a lowly stable; his companions were the ox and the ass, his cradle a manger. The Messiah, long-awaited by the Jewish people as a King, is born into poverty and instability. Shortly after his birth, to escape the persecution of Herod, Joseph is prompted in a dream by an angel to find safety and security. God sends a messenger to protect his family. The picture of Joseph leading the donkey carrying Mary and the child Jesus is very familiar and a beautiful picture of a family struggling against the power of evil and violence in search of safety.

Both the gospel and the first reading emphasize God's love for the vulnerable, whether the child or the older person. In biblical times, nomadic people who were constantly moving from pasture to pasture might have been tempted to abandon the weakest and oldest members of their families. The first reading shows how it is God's wish that the elderly have a special place in the family and are respected as "encyclopedias of wisdom" (Pope John Paul II).

The flight to Egypt is a reminder that many centuries before this journey, Joseph, of the coat of many colors, was taken to the court of Pharaoh as a slave. It was later that Moses, who was called by God, would lead the Jewish people from slavery to the Promised Land in the great journey of the Exodus. Indeed the return of the holy family to Nazareth recalls the journey from slavery to freedom. Jesus will be the New Moses who will free his people from the slavery of sin and give the promise of eternal life through death and resurrection.

In many ways, families in war torn parts of our world experience the flight into Egypt. It may be to escape persecution and violence. Refugees and asylum seekers, knocking on the door of Europe, America and the developed world, share in the common humanity of the family of God. As we witness their pain and sadness, the words of St. Paul ring in our ears: "Be clothed in sincere compassion, in kindness and humility, gentleness and patience." The orphan, the widow, the poor and the stranger have a special place in God's love. As Pope John Paul II said in the context of the Year of Jubilee, "if we recall that Jesus came to 'preach the good news to the poor', how can we fail to lay greater emphasis on the Church's preferential option for the poor and outcast?" This plea goes out to us and our governments and surely asks us to reflect on how our systems deal with asylum seekers. They must be treated with respect and their cases be examined in the light of justice and charity. Closer to home, the flight into Egypt will prompt us to think of



usually women and children, seeking safety from domestic violence.

How sensitive is our parish community to all these issues and to the needs of the most vulnerable, especially children and the elderly? May the Feast of the Holy Family remind us of the gift and innocence of all our children. As a Church, improvements in policy regarding child protection have been needed and are being fully implemented. The aim is to protect children from violence and make the Church a place where the protection of the weakest is evident. And then there are the elderly: who deserve a privileged place in the community. God chooses each person in a special and unique way. The message of Christ is that the commandment of love must be visible and active in each family and every community, touching into the lives of each of us from the moment of conception to the day the Lord calls us to himself.

May our Families Experience the Peace of the Holy Family Always,

What is Alpha for Teens?

Alpha for Teens is a 9-week course that creates a space where teens can be excited to bring their friends for a conversation about Jesus. The series offers compelling stories, images, questions, and discussion topics well spread throughout each episode to better engage youth, helping them think about how these issues relate to their



lives as they discuss with their friends and leaders. In each session, we'll eat food, watch a talk, and discuss questions in small groups.

All High School teens are invited to attend our weekly Alpha for Teen Series, beginning **Sunday**, **January 12**, **6:15-7:30 PM**, **in the Saint John of the Cross Parish Center.** All are invited to come to share a meal, watch a short video, and talk about questions and topics from the video. 

DAILY REFLECTION—ST. JOHN'S ABBEY

We can only use the Psalms as prayers for ourselves if we're willing to let pass some of the more distasteful or incomprehensible elements we meet there. The authors call down God's rage on their opponents; we don't have to. We don't have to remind God of all the "great things" we have done. But we can find in the Psalms many a phrase which can serve as a theme for the day, an expression of what we hope for. "The Lord is my strength and my salvation." "In you, O Lord, I trust." "In you alone is my soul at rest." Or, what often strikes me in Psalm (50)51,14: "With a spirit of fervor sustain me" and right before that, "Give me again the joy of your help."

That last verse might be good to pull out when one feels less than excited about the upcoming day and its tasks. We can, of course, do simply natural human things that galvanize. But repeating these phrases as a sort of mantra might help to change our attitude. "Give me again the joy of your help." Help me, Lord, to be grateful for my life and work and to show it by my spirit, by some joy. Despite an occasional bad or less than fervent mood, we may be able to recall happy elements within, e.g., a generally very happy life, good work to do and wonderful people to work with. A little reflection may bring up thoughts of my good fortune relative to many others, urge me to show some goodwill and love to all those around me. We could end up thinking there is really no serious reason for not feeling grateful and even joyous.


Let me not waste the day, my time in listlessness, aimlessness, boredom, lassitude. Help me face each moment, each task, each person I encounter, with enthusiasm and appreciation, with my whole heart and strength. Help me to be fervent rather than frightened, generous rather than grumbling, hopeful rather than fatalistic, encouraging rather than dispiriting, eager rather than tepid. "With a spirit of fervor sustain me, Lord."

SALVATION IN DAILY LIFE

This Sunday is the feast of the Holy Family, which comes on the first Sunday after Christmas Day. Today's feast celebrates how the humanity of Jesus (including his entire family life) has brought saving significance into the daily rhythms of our human family life.

The scriptures offer instruction and encouragement on how to share—within our families, parish families, and the wider human family—the love that God shares with us in Jesus. Selections from Sirach, Psalm 128, and Colossians encourage us to reflect divine love and thus find holiness in all our human relationships. The reading from Matthew's Gospel offers a living example of love in the actions Joseph took to protect his young family from danger and to nurture them within the larger family of faith of their time.

TODAY'S READINGS

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First Reading — Those who honor and comfort their parents shall never be forgotten (Sirach 3:2-6, 12-14).

Psalm — Blessed are those who fear the Lord and walk in his ways (Psalm 128).

Second Reading — You are called into one body. Bear with one another; forgive one another; let Christ's peace control you (Colossians 3:12-21 [12-17]).

Gospel — Joseph rose, took the child and his mother, and fled to Egypt (Matthew 2:13-15, 19-23).

SAINT THOMAS BECKET (1118-1170)

December 29

To anyone who imagines conflict between religion and politics to be a modern phenomenon, history witnesses otherwise. Martyred under Henry VIII in 1535, Thomas More declared, "I die the king's good servant, but God's first!" Thomas Becket could have said the same four centuries earlier. As Henry II's closest friend and trusted chancellor, Becket, the king presumed, could be counted on, if made archbishop, to deliver the church to royal control. But Becket experienced a profound conversion, confirmed by the ordination liturgy's rich symbolism of the bishop as Good Shepherd and the church as Bride of Christ. Renouncing secular responsibilities, distributing his wealth to the poor. Thomas became the church's uncompromising champion. Faced with this "new" Becket, the king's previous friendship turned into a ferocious, almost irrational hatred. As eight centuries later, Archbishop Romero would be martyred at the altar of Christ's sacrifice, Becket was slain before the altar of Canterbury Cathedral by royal agents, neither the first nor last good shepherd to lay down his life as the price of freedom for Christ's church and justice for Christ's sheep. -Peter Scagnelli, Copyright © J. A few weeks ago Marlene & I went on a trip to England & Ireland, the highlight of which was a pilgrimage to the "Knock Shrine" - Full title being "The Shine of Our Lady of Knock, The Queen of Ireland"

Marlene had, for sometime, felt drawn to visit this Marian Apparition site but wasn't sure why, however, the pull was irresistible and so we went. It would be fair to say that "Our Lady of Knock" is a lesser known Apparition relative to Lourdes, Fatima, Guadalupe (see later) but nonetheless of very great significant, especially to the people of Ireland.

A brief history of the Apparition at Knock Co. Mayo, Ireland

On the evening of Thursday August 21, 1879, at around 8.00pm, (it was raining heavily - The apparition site with actual size imagine that in Ireland !!), when Mary Byrne and Mary MCloughlin, who were walking home came upon an amazing sight, it stopped them in their tracks. Mary Byrne ran home to tell others who also gathered to view the miraculous site on the gable end of the parish church. It was the Apparition of Our Lady together with St. Joseph and St John the Evangelist and a Lamb on an altar suspended by angels behind which was a large cross.

Various accounts, 15 individuals in total, were recorded by a Commission of Enquiry which concluded that the testimonies were valid. It is recorded that this small group of people knelt in prayer, in the pouring rain for two hours.

They individually told the commission that Mary, who stood a few feet above the ground as with the whole apparition, was wearing a white cloak fastened to the neck and a brightly lit crown with a single rose.

More details are available but suffice to say that all witnesses noted in spite of the weather, the area of the apparition remained completely dry.and bathed in golden light.

A few interesting facts about this apparition

- The only one in which Mary was accompanied.
- Mary did not speak or communicate a message
- Mary appeared at a terrible time in Ireland's history failed potato crops, famine and starvation.
- As with other apparitions she appeared to poor and suffering.

Why ???

The reason seems obvious – she wanted to encourage the people of Ireland, predominantly Catholic, in their struggles. At this time Ireland was part of Great Britain and much of the country was owned by absentee "British" landowners. Most cared little for their Irish tenants, only that they paid the rent in a timely fashion, regardless of the impact of the seasons on their crops. This led to the truly miserable conditions eloquently described by Tom Neary in Chapters 1 & 2 of his book "I Saw Our Lady".

Some forty years later Ireland would be divided into Catholic South and Protestant North and I would suggest that the Mary's Apparition gave the Irish Catholics the impetus to separate from mainland Britain, and although this is my personal view – t it seems consistent with facts and circumstances of the events in Knock, Co Mayo, Ireland some 140 years ago.

The opening lines of the "Prayer of our Lady of Knock" are:

Our Lady of Knock, Queen of Ireland, you gave hope to your people in a time of distress and comforted them in sorrow

As Marlene & I reflected on our visit, Marlene said she believed she felt now she understood that she was drawn to Knock and given a mission to tell the story which is so little known (outside Ireland).

So this is the first part of that mission – enjoy.


